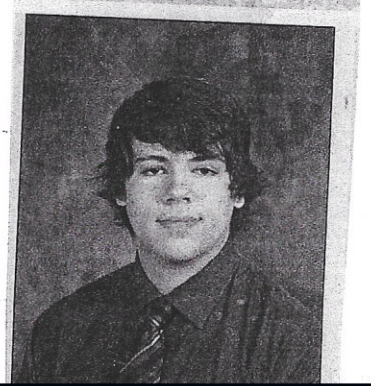
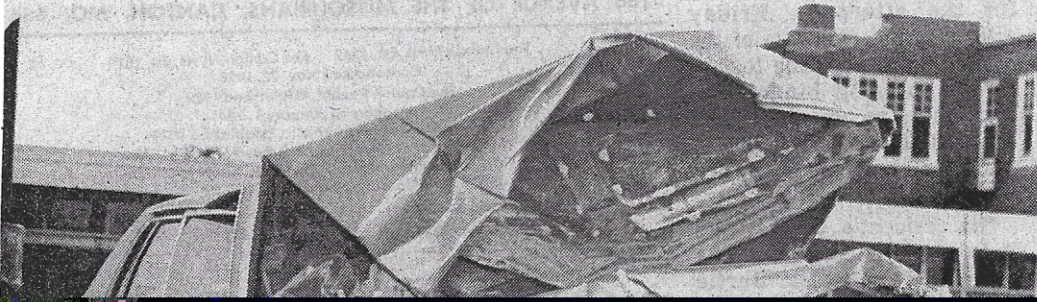

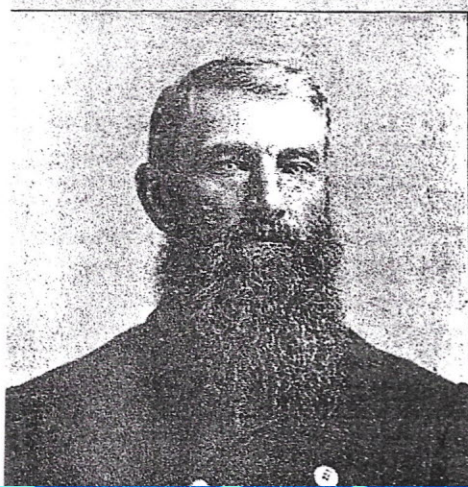

**MRS. LUCILE CORDER, 35,
DIES FOLLOWING STROKE**

Many Indicator readers will regret to learn of the death of Mrs. Lucile Lillard Corder, age 35, who suffered a stroke last Thursday while engaged in domestic duties at her home at Corder, Lafayette County.

The decedent was the only child of Mr. and Mrs. Addie Lillard of Ten Mile community and was niece of Mrs. M. S. Harrison sr. of this community. Her mother, before her marriage to Mr. Lillard, was Miss Fannie Barker of this city.

The body was brought, Sunday, to Old Wyaconda Baptist Church where Rev. H. M. Hunt conducted the service Sunday afternoon. R. L. McLeod sang, with accompaniment by Miss Marjorie Johnson. Burial was in Forest Grove Cemetery, Canton.

The esteem in which Mrs. Corder was held is shown in the following comment taken from the Indicator's Ten Mile correspondence, written by Mrs. John Ellis:

"The coming of the New Year has brought sorrow instead of gladness to our community. Death is never welcome but when it suddenly places its cold finger on the young, the blow is harder to understand.

"When the word came of the sudden passing away of Lucile Lillard Corder, there was sorrow in every home where Lucile was known. Always cheerful, happy and of unusually lovable disposition she was able to number her friends by the score. She was capable, energetic and accomplished, making her influence appreciated among those with whom she was associated.

"All neighbors and friends share the grief of her parents and other relatives. A life like hers surely will leave its impress for good on those who knew and loved her best."

The following obituary was read at the funeral services held in the Corder home Saturday afternoon:

Miriam Lucille Lillard was born Feb. 11, 1897, at LaGrange, Mo., and passed away at her home near Corder, Mo., Dec. 29, 1932, at the age of 35 years, 10 months and 18 days. She was the only child of Elias Addison and Frances Barker Lillard and the only grandchild of David and Artemissa Lillard in whose home she spent her early girlhood with her parents. Into this home were later taken two orphan cousins, John and Obie Wilson, who were as brothers to her.

At the age of 14 she confessed her Savior and united with Wyaconda Baptist Church under the pastorate of Rev. G. C. Kell. Her cheerful, unselfish life has been a living testimony to the faith and love she had for her Savior. Truly it can be said, "She went about doing good," spreading cheer and sunshine wherever she went.

In the fall of 1913 she and her grandparents moved to LaGrange where she attended LaGrange College, specializing in expression. After three years there she continued her studies at the Quincy College of Music and Expression from which she was graduated in 1917.

The following fall she entered Stephens College, Columbia, Mo., and after a few months' study there she was called home by the death of her grandmother. Ill health prevented her return to school and she devoted her time to the loving care of her grandfather.

On January 4th, 1927, she was united in marriage to Austin Corder. The six short years of her married life have been joyous years in which she has won and held scores of friends with her kindly deeds, sincere interest and sympathy for all with whom she came in contact. Her first thought has always been to help others. The friendly interest she has had in all her neighbors has brought about a greater love and understanding between them and has been a force for good in the community....

She leaves to mourn her passing her husband, her parents and a host of other relatives and friends.

Friends and relatives were much shocked when news came Thursday afternoon of the sudden death of Mrs. Lucille Lillard Corder. The remains were brought here and funeral at Wyaconda Church Sunday afternoon. Our sympathy goes out to the family in their sorrow. 1-1933
