George W Breeding adult heir of John Breeding decd & William Blair Guardian to John Breeding, Oathey Breeding, Nancy Breeding, Mary J Breeding, Lydia A Breeding, & Sarah A Breeding, infant heirs of said John decd & William H Judd infant heir of Parthena Judd late Breeding who was a daughter & heir at law of said John Breeding decd Plffs [Plaintiffs] against Milton Martin & Serena Martin his wife Deffs [Defendants]

The plaintiff George W Breeding Wiliam Blair & William H Judd state that John Breeding departed this life in Adair County on the day of 18?? seized & possessed of a certain tract of land situated in Adair County on Sulphur for Fork a [braclect?] of Rupells Creek, containing 250 acres which was patented to him by William Owsley Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky on the 25th of May 1845 & leaving the plaintiff George W Breeding & the infants John, Oathey, Nancy, Mary J., Lydia A, & Sarah A. Breeding & the defendants Serena Martin (late Breeding) & decedent Parthena Judd (late Breeding) his children and only heirs at law. Said Parthena has since died leaving the infant Joseph H Judd her only child & only heir at law. The tract of land is poor, of comparatively small value, incapable of being divided among the nine heirs aforesaid. In fact such a division would much impair its value. It would greatly [vdorund?] to the interest of all parties to sell the land and divide the proceeds accordingly to law. They pray for a [decie/decision] for that purpose, that the proper steps maybe taken, all proper & necessary orders made & that such other relief be granted them as maybe right & proper. The land is not worth \$100 per share. They pray for a proper relief.
